



# Transitional Kindergarten Supply List



The following supplies are for your child's use:

- 1 old oversized T-shirt (smock) for painting, labeled with child's name
- 12- #2 pencils Ticonderoga Beginners sharpened pencils
- 8- large glue sticks
- 1 pair 5" pointed-tip scissors for children (Fiskars soft grip)
- 1- small bottle Elmer's white school glue
- 2- boxes of 8 count Large Crayola crayons (NOT Jumbo)
- 1- box of 24 count regular Crayola crayons
- 1- box 10 count Crayola Markers (broad line classic colors)
- 2- 8 count Crayola water color paint set
- 1- large container of Clorox Wipes
- 1- large box facial tissue
- 1- roll of paper towels
- 1- ream of white paper
- 1- set of headphones labeled with child's name in Ziplock bag  
\*(no ear buds please)
- Full change of clothes (shirt, pants, underwear, socks)
- 1 nap mat with attached pillow and blanket
